Principles underlying the Special educational needs and disability Code of Practice: 0 to 25 years July 2014

The Code of Practice describes the principles that should be observed by all professionals working with children and young people who have special educational needs or disabilities.

These include:

- Taking into account the view of children, young people and their families
- Enabling children, young people and their parents / carers to participate in decision making
- Collaborating with partners in education, health and social care to provide support
- Identifying the needs of children and young people
- Making high quality provision to meet the needs of children and young people
- Focusing on inclusive practices and removing barriers to learning
- Helping children and voung people to prepare for adulthood

There is a rigorous pupil progress tracking system in place which ensures all children are monitored termly. Access to equipment which helps writing: slope boards, pencil grips, a range of writing implements Trained teaching assistants are able to deliver "Jungle Journey", "Dough disco", "Clever Fingers" and "write dance" activities to help develop core strength and develop fine motor skills A care plan and an evacuation plan is written for all pupils with mobility or other needs in conjunction with health professionals Risk assessments are put into place where a child has a broken limb that effects mobility. Liaise closely with outside agencies who help us support children with physical needs, such as occupational therapists and hearing impairment support. Appropriate training provided for staff as required by children's specific needs Plans given to us by healthcare professionals such as the physiotherapist are delivered, monitored and evaluated. Parents/ Carers are consulted and regular feedback is given. Teaching assistants are confident in the delivery of programmes devised by How do we help a child speech and language therapists with speech and language Close liaison with speech and language therapists; TA's are given time with the needs? therapists and children to ensure they are delivering programmes correctly We refer pupils to Speech and Language Therapy when necessary. Interventions such as Talk Boost and Nursery Narrative increase vocabulary, speech and language. Every class takes part in Word Aware, encouraging the learning of a wider Communication and language is embedded in school life. All teachers prompt and promote talking in full sentences. The delivery of Essential Letters and Sounds encourages, clear articulation of sounds, speaking in sentences and the learning of new words.

How will we develop social skills throughout the school day, especially break times? How do we allocate resources?	 Our school employs Teaching Assistants for focused group work, work on individual targets, 1:1 reading or as the class teacher deems valuable in meeting the specific needs of children in the classroom Nurture Group sessions timetabled All children regularly reviewed (at least once a term) and provision is then tailored to match their needs. Interventions where necessary.
How do we ensure all staff are well trained?	 Significant budgetary commitment to staff training Personalised Performance Management objectives for all staff Commitment to maintain levels of training if staff leave Induction programme in place for new members of staff in the school Well planned programme of CPD, accessing both external agencies and inschool support
How do we raise awareness of special educational needs for parents and the wider community?	 Parents / Carers are invited to talk about initial concerns Parents / carers invited to at least termly meetings to discuss their child's progress. Achievements of children with SEND are celebrated All children are included in all school activities and events SENCo builds relationships with parents, parents are seen as partners in their child's education.

If a parent / carer has a concern or a complaint in most cases complaints would be successfully resolved informally by teachers, senior teachers and the headteacher. If a complaint cannot be resolved in an informal way and / or the complainant still remains unhappy the complaint would be addressed following the complaints procedure agreed by the Governors.
